

SCHOOL COUNCIL NEWS – Term 3

FUNDRAISING & COVID

With the constraints COVID-19 and lockdowns have had on fundraising opportunities this year, we are pleased with the response we have had to the fundraisers we have been able to conduct under the circumstances. For a 'normal' year, the School's fundraising calendar presents a number of chances to raise money to enhance what the school can offer, therefore minimising the need to rely on financial support from our families and possible grant application success. These annual events include catering at The Vintage Machinery Show in March, Booktown in May and the Clunes Show in November, along with our Tree Drive, Twilight Markets, Trivia



Nights and any other BBQ/Catering opportunities where they arise (Bunnings, Clearing Sales, Election Day). We are very conscious not to financially fatigue our School families, and know that we have a brilliant community who supports our school to enable us to undertake projects to improve our school, better our students, and ultimately, benefit and lift our town in the short and long term.

As our Tree Drive was not able to go ahead in 2020, we were very fortunate to be able to raise a record amount of around \$2,500 this year. This project was greatly supported by Clunes and district community members, for which we are very grateful. This money will make a big difference by enabling us to support several current projects including the purchase of a new reclining chair for our sick bay.

Fundraisers undertaken during the year within the School (including Discos, Mother's and Father's Day Stalls and Hot Lunch Days) are primarily for the benefit of the students, given how they enjoyed them as events in themselves, with the raising of money a secondary benefit.

Even with COVID regulations, our students have been able to attend four out of six Term Discos and purchase items for Mother's and Father's Day. From the Stalls alone this year, we have raised a total of \$750. The Discos are Student led and money raised at these events are managed by the Junior School Council. This money has been used to support charities of their choosing, or more recently, to purchase new UNO cards and Rubiks cubes for the School for all students to use.

Outcomes Achieved with Fundraising Money

Fundraising money is always put back into the School, for the direct benefit of our students.

Our fundraising efforts have significantly contributed to, or funded entirely, major projects over the past few years, including:

- installation of air conditioning in the multi-purpose hall
- full refurbishment of external male and female student toilets
- purchase of water tank & irrigation system, including plumbing
- upgrade of Soccer pitch, including new goals
- construction of gravel walking track around ovals
- new shade shed over senior playground
- planting of trees around oval, with drip-irrigation
- purchase of equipment, including: art room printing press, library trolleys, Lego, STEM equipment, tables & stools, reading chairs and headphones
- purchase of learning resources, including Reading Comprehension Sets
- upgrade of interactive whiteboards, iPads and phone system
- fit out of our new shed (storage cupboards and flooring)
- upgrade of ride-on lawn mower
- external painting projects
- purchasing of new school sports shirts
- continual upgrading of sports equipment
- upgrade of lighting to LEDs

School Council would sincerely like to thank everybody who has involved themselves in the abovementioned fundraising activities and contributed to their success, whether that be from the management of the Tree Drive to filling in and returning a pie order form, each action makes a big difference to our school.

Father's Day Stall - 2021

Unfortunately, due to stock issues and lock down interruptions, we were unable to source some items to fill all our orders. We are extremely grateful to those families who were happy to allow substitution of items. We thank you very much for your understanding.

Pie Drive – 2021

Although our winter Pie Drive saw only a relatively low number of orders, it has raised an additional \$360 for our school. This did not meet our intended target but is still a good outcome. We thank Matt & Wendy from **O'Haras @ Clunes Bakery & Café**, and encourage all families to support this local business, who continues to support our school.

CLUNES PS & COVID

We have been plunged in and out of lockdowns, with periods of Home Learning, and each time our School has risen to the challenge and has ensured that our families and students are supported throughout.

When students have returned to 'normal' on-site learning, the school has ensured that they have offered as many opportunities to engage and enhance learning as possible, while also being considerate to their wellbeing. Last year our students were able to participate in their Swimming unit, a day camp to Log Cabin Lodge, a 'mini Energy Breakthrough' Event, Year 6 Graduation Dinner, and this year we have been able to hold both our Swimming and Athletic Sports, Cross Country, GRIP Student Leaders Convention, Discos in Terms 1 & 2, incursions, the Story Dog program, writing in Queens Park, walk to school, "welcome" afternoon, focus activities and Parent/Teacher/Student conferences. Additionally, a number of students attended Somers Camp.

These activities are crucial in maintaining a sense of normality for our students. While a lot of other students across our State are missing out on events such as these and annual school highlights, Clunes Primary School sees the importance in trying to create the balance of learning and wellbeing and extra engaging, memorable activities.

On behalf of the School Council, we would like to thank our Parents/Carers and Home Learning Teachers for your commitment and resilience shown through the many periods of Home Learning we have experienced this year. We also thank our teachers and support staff for their dedication and providing unwavering support to our families and students both learning remotely and those on-site.

Fundraising is certainly a part of the role of School Council at Clunes Primary School, but not the sole function. School Council is responsible in assisting the efficient governance of the school, to ensure that decisions affecting the students are made to the best interests of the students, to enhance the educational opportunities of the students and to ensure that the School and Council comply with Government requirements, including the review and implementation of policies.
