Dear Parents/Caregivers,

This is our final newsletter for the 2021 school year and we are all very, very proud of our students and the effort they have given throughout what has been another very challenging but also very rewarding year for us. You have supported your children magnificently and we sincerely thank you!

As the very proud Principal of Clunes Primary School for 9 years now, I have relished the opportunity to work closely with all students, staff and school community members with a core focus always in mind- to improve the learning opportunities and outcomes for all of our students.

Opportunities and Successes – We began the year with a new School Strategic Plan 2021-2025, following a year of Review in 2020. Staff professional development continued with a targeted ongoing focus to improve student learning outcomes in Numeracy and Literacy. The Tutor Learning Initiative supported students needing both catch-up and extension, following a COVID effected Remote Teaching and Learning 2020. This has now been extended into 2022 and will be led by Mrs. Vicki Anderson. Developing Student Voice and Agency within student learning, particularly supporting students to set, analyse and provide feedback linked with their own individual learning goals was a focus, and this will continue in 2022. Learning Intentions and Success Criteria will again be words and actions that you will hear a lot about!

DET 'Equity' funding facilitated our continued commitment to ensure successful teaching and learning for students and staff. We implemented the Department of Education Respectful Relationships program with a continued focus on understanding Self and Emotions, targeting building resilience, and also managing bullying, 'bystander behaviours' and 'putdowns' as key areas. This will continue again into 2022 as we continue as a school community and right across the state, and nation, to manage and recover from the unique challenges of 2020 and 2021.

Limited, but positive school student, staff and parent survey results and student achievement data has reflected the success we have again experienced in 2021, despite an academically, socially and emotionally demanding year for all. Extra-curricular opportunities needed to be once again reduced and / or modified significantly, sometimes at very short notice. We were however still able to utilise a Rural Arts Grant providing a six months Performing Arts program with all students P-6, by Luke. A highlight also had to be our whole school excursion to the Halls Gap Zoo! We all loved this adventure and plan to continue a whole school excursion program in 2022.

We also all look forward to a 2022 that will include a revised Camps Program and hopefully we will be able to once again enjoy all of our regular extra-curricular activities eg. Energy Breakthrough in Maryborough, Earth Education excursions and other curriculum related excursions and incursions. Eg. Sovereign Hill.

See-Saw implementation across the school to build home/ school communication relationships will be a focus in 2022.

My sincere thanks is extended to all of our staff, our families and our community for your continued support, communication and involvement in our school. I value your contribution, ideas, support and physical presence (thankfully again) in our school. (QR Code & Double Vaccinated proof of course). The benefits to having our students all back on-site have been significant.

The smiles on the faces of our students say it all!

As the proud Principal of this wonderful school I can't ask for more! Thank you.

Mr Hoffmann – farewell article

To all families, students and staff of the Clunes Primary School community,

As I begin the monumental task of tidying my belongings before the end of the year, I wish to extend my sincerest gratitude and thanks to everyone who has wished me well ahead of my exciting – yet slightly daunting - challenge as Assistant Principal at Lake Bolac P-12 College next year. While I am immensely excited, I certainly have some mixed feelings about leaving such a warm and nurturing school community that I have been associated with for almost half of my life.

Flashback to 2005! I am in my second year of a Bachelor of Education at the University of Ballarat (known for some time now as Federation University – feeling old!). In the previous year I had done a teaching placement at Learmonth Primary School (which has been closed for some time now – feeling older!). I was hoping to score my second-year placement at a school in Ballarat, because I felt like I'd "done my time" driving out to Learmonth the previous year. I must confess that my initial reaction to learning that I had to travel even further out – to the distant realm of Clunes – was one of disappointment. I felt a little hard done by that I might have to set a slightly earlier alarm every now and then. Poor diddums to me!

That feeling of disappointment was completely flipped on its head from the moment I entered this most incredible of schools. I was greeted with a warmth and sense of welcoming that I hadn't experienced before. I wasn't sure what it was at the time, but the culture that I was integrated into had a profound effect on me. I loved how all the teachers knew the students, and vice-versa. I loved the sense of family and togetherness that permeated every classroom and spilled out into the yard. I loved how I was made to feel valued and "part of it", despite my obvious lack of experience or expertise.

By the end of the year I had finished my placement (in Mr Doug Oswin's class), but I was thirsty for more and was desperate to continue my learning journey in such an amazing place. I asked thenprincipal, Mr Andrew Parry, if I could return in 2006 to volunteer and lend support in classrooms. I saw it as an opportunity to really cement my classroom management skills, as well as learning about teaching across the curriculum. Mr Parry – with a wry smirk that some of you may remember – replied to my request with, "You play guitar as well, don't you?" Flash-forward to the end of 2008, and I'd spent close to three years being paid by the school to run an instrumental music program as well as supporting particular students with additional needs in the classroom – all while still studying my degree. To add to this, rather than give me a good reference check, Mr Parry gave me my first full-time job as a classroom teacher – fresh out of university from the beginning of 2009. On one hand I couldn't believe my luck – to ACTUALLY land a job in the school that I already loved and felt part of – but I also knew that I'd been incredibly well supported and encouraged to keep my head down, to learn, and to work as hard as I could for the students.

In the years following, I had different principals (none greater than our incredible Ms Jardine, who seems to be everywhere – always – and has an endless supply of positive energy), as well as different school leaders to learn from, but the culture remained consistent and I always felt supported to be the best teacher I could be. I started putting my hand up to take on additional responsibilities, as a means to "give back" to the school community for supporting and nurturing me. I began teaching Japanese and music in addition to my classroom duties, spent five of the best years of my career teaching Prep, and took on various leadership opportunities such as in leading Numeracy (with the support of Mrs Longmire) and implementing the Extended Mathematical Understandings (EMU) program. I mentored a pre-service teacher – Miss Maddy Rosewarne – who is now doing a fine job at Gordon Primary School, and supported a very young but eager-to-learn Miss Jordyn Dargaville. What a teacher they have both become! Both are incredibly hard-working; however I feel proud that I may have played a small role in their development, just as Mrs Karren Jennings, Mr Chris Charleson and Mrs Di Bongiorno had done for me at the beginning of my career.

That brings me to where I am today. My desire to guide and support my colleagues to be the best that they can be has led me through a stint as Education Improvement Leader across the Central Highlands Area from mid-2018-2020, and through four months as Acting Assistant Principal at Ararat Primary School earlier this year. That leadership journey will continue for me next year at Lake Bolac College and will provide a fresh array of unique challenges, however I feel that I am ready and well-prepared.

I am proud to say that the culture within the walls of Clunes Primary School is every bit as strong and supportive now as it was back in 2005. It has truly become a part of who I am as a teacher and as a person, and I am excited to bring it with me to a new school setting. Difficult though it is to be leaving, I am pleased to have half a lifetime of treasured memories and hilarious anecdotes of the hundreds of little faces that I have been very lucky to be involved with at Clunes PS over the years. I have also formed lifelong friendships with our amazing staff; I love each of you dearly and will miss you terribly, although I'd better keep getting invited to staff-functions or my crank-o-metre will be cranked up to 11!

Anyway – that's about enough from me, because the tissue box next to me is just about "cactus". Thank you so much, Clunes Primary School – for everything. You have truly given me everything ©


