ANZAC Day by Kara

In 1914, the Great War began after the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand, who was a minor royal of Hungary. Word of the start of the war got out, and people rolled in to enlist. From young daring men to fit old blokes. Some wanting a meal a day, others wanting to travel and see another country. After four long months of training in Egypt they were ready to leave for Gallipoli. There was 40 ships with 30,000 troops and nearly 8000 horses. After many days on the water the ANZACS finally reached the beach that is now known as ANZAC Cove. After they realised it was the wrong beach they started to climb the dangerous cliff with the Turkish troops gunfire raining down on them. Of the 60,000 who went to Gallipoli, 26,000 were casualties and more than 8000 never returned home.

Another battle, the battle of Fromelles, didn't go for long yet it had a very big impact. The battle began at 6pm on the 19th of July 1916 and ended at 8am the next morning. In that time there was 7000 Australian casualties including 2400 killed.

One of the reasons for this battle was to draw German troops away from the Somme Offensive. During the first day of the offensive, the British army had 60,000 casualties, with nearly a third of those dead.

Now we remember them on this day, ANZAC Day. It is a day to look back on the sacrifice made by our ancestors. The service men and women who served for our country. We have gained so much from these people. If it wasn't for them, Australia wouldn't be as great as it is today. They left home for a new experience and returned home with bravery, courage and resilience. I am happy and grateful to be standing here in Australia, in peace.

Part of commemorating the ANZACs is to look back and remember our ancestors and the sacrifices they made. I will remember:

Henry Rankin, who was a driver.

Ella Redman, who was a nurse.

Her belongings are displayed in the Creswick museum.

It is difficult for me to imagine myself in their shoes. Digging trenches taller than a man. Being a nurse, caring for wounded men, unsure if they will survive. Living as a family member back home, paying one penny for a telegram, not knowing if it's going to be good news.

Today we thank all those who risked their lives to protect and fight for our country. We thank the families and mothers for their hope and support from home. We thank the nurses for mending the soldiers and helping more of them return home. We thank "man's best friend" during the war, the light horses. And we thank those who are still serving today.

What ANZAC Day means to me: Reece H-D.

Heroes: they come in many different shapes and sizes. In World War 1, heroes were all around. From diggers to pilots, from doctors to nurses, from soldiers, fighting out on the front lines, to volunteers wrapping bandages and knitting socks to send to hospitals and army camps, all around the battle zones. They are all heroes. Heroes to be remembered.

Everyone who came back from war had a story. Some of these stories are familiar to many, they are told in schools and in the community and become legendary. Such stories may include Simpson and his Donkey or the bravery of the ANZACS during the landing at Gallipoll.

The ANZACS also played a vital role in many other significant campaigns during World War 1. There is one battle in particular which I believe showed great courage from both man and beast.

It was the 31st of October 1917. The ANZACS were preparing for the Battle of Beersheba. 800 horsemen had trained for 5 months and were ready to test their skills. The men had ridden throughout the night, positioning themselves, ready to charge.

Beersheba was a desert town held by Turks. The town was protected by a system of trenches on three sides, leaving the east side open. The Turks thought there was no way the enemy would approach through the desert. But they had another thing coming.

The horsemen galloped into the town, with bayonets on the end of their rifles. They met with heavy fire from the enemy. Records show the Turkish army had 28 artillery guns, 9 machine guns, 2 aircraft and 4,400 men. The Turkish lost 500 of these men that day and the ANZAC's captured 1,500. It seemed like a big victory.

The 4th and 12th Light Horse Brigades were made up of ordinary stockmen, ringers, jackaroos, Bushmen and many of them were riding their own horses. About 100 of these men were lidigenous Australians and were not even considered to be Australian citizens yet. They rode together, fought together, succeeded together and unfortunately, 32 ANZAC soldiers and 70 horses, died

The horses went over to Beersheba with their army. The horses were referred to as Walers, since the majority of them were from New South Wales. For two long days, they went without water as they rode through the harsh desert.

Man and horse, together conquering Beersheba. This battle is not as celebrated as more famous battles, such as the landing at Gallipoli, but it is one that shows great courage and strength from both horse and man, displaying great ANZAC spirit. I would like to read you a poem that I have written about this battle.

The Battle of Beersheba

They stood

They waited

They rode towards danger and looked it in the eye

With gunshots left, right and centre

They rode

For the victory of Australia

And to all those men.

I stand and salute

There are two types of days: days you want to hold on to and remember forever and the ones you want to forget. Days to cherish and days to put at the back of your mind. But no matter who you are, wherever throughout Australia you live, there is one day of the year that makes our nation stand still in silence. The day, although sad, when you must remember and never forget.

What does ANZAC Day mean to me? It means courage, bravery, adversity and hardship but more than that, it means standing together, resilience and mateship; it means remembering all those who fought and were lost.

Lest we forget.
