Term 2 summary: Our second term of the 2024 school year has been a very engaging, busy and productive one!

Thank you all for your commitment to our wonderful school and to the ongoing learning and wellbeing successes for our students.

This term we have among other achievements:

- Conducted weekly Student Leadership Meetings (where possible), including our School Captains and School Vice-Captains. Student led Clubs were a feature of the term including Writing Club, Soccer Club, Green Team and Hut (Fort) Building! There were one-off clubs too that will begin in Term 3 again, such as Crochet Club, and Rubrik's Club will begin again! Thank you Jake and Izzy!
- Celebrated weekly Students of the Week!
- Reaffirmed our class, yard, school bus and community rights and responsibilities with our students, in line with our School Values and Positive Behaviour Support and You Can Do It approaches.
- We celebrated a Beckworth win in the House Athletics Sports but were very proud of all participants!
- On ANZAC Day, at the Cenotaph, our School Captain, Brock Booth, read Stanza 2 of the Ode to all attending members of the wider Clunes community, supported by School Captain, Chloe Velden. School Vice Captains; Xavier Featherston and Dyllan Smith readily assisted our School Captains with the wreath laying. James Weston and Elsie Clark wrote and delivered moving speeches to the wider community also at the Cenotaph ceremony. Our Guard of Honour is always a very moving spectacle. Thank you Prep to Year Six participants!
- 2 x Junior School Council Meetings (JSC) were conducted incorporating Student Voice and Agency into decision making within the school. The JSC students provided delicious treats (with support) and Glo products (fundraising) at the P-6 Disco. It was lovely to be able to provide our parents with a meet a greet social space at this time in the Staff Room too! (Following the success of this parent led idea, we will endeavour to always have this as an opportunity from now on).
- The annual Dept of Ed Attitudes to School Survey was conducted with all year 4, 5 and 6 students. (Results back in T. 3)
- Staff actively participated in OH & S Meetings and continued to complete multiple modules and compulsory training, keeping the safety and wellbeing of all foremost in our minds. Jan led an Anapen training session for staff.
- Staff Professional Learning and review was heavily focussed on our upcoming School Performance Review. Parents and Carers were invited to complete a Satisfaction Survey in relation to this and twenty-five families supported this invitation.
- Success was had by our students participating in the local Clunes & Division Ballarat Cross Country.
- 39 students participated in the District Llanberris Athletics Sports in Ballarat. Several students will go on to compete at a Regional event next term, again at the Llanberris Reserve.
- 2 x very productive School Council Meetings were conducted.
- The Mother's Day stall was very well supported. (Thank you!)
- Our Thursday Hot Lunches were very popular! (Thank you!)
- Our Walking Track/ EB training track around the perimeter of the school got a real workout, backed up by 'Go Noodle' indoors when the weather was inclement.... Walk to School was very well supported!
- Various facilities/grounds projects commenced/were completed to improve an overall positive and safe working and learning environment for the school. A Working Bee was supported by a small number of hard-working families. Please support our Term 3 Working Bee when it is scheduled! Our Junior (Internal Toilets) upgrade was completed!
- Our Parents/ Fundraising Group superstars tried to meet monthly and some parents were able to attend. We actively encourage other parents to become involved in Parents /Fundraising Group meetings and activities. A T. 3 schedule is out!
- School Review, The Resilience Project, Literacy, Numeracy, Student Voice and Agency, Respectful Relationships, Goal Setting and Feedback, and Professional Learning Community (PLC) professional learning was a focus for all teaching staff. -Mrs B led the Tutor Learning Initiative (TLI) Literacy focus for identified students.
- Two students in Year 6 engaged in the Numeracy High Ability Program.
- Our Year 5s and 6s thoroughly enjoyed Camp Wyuna!
- We were gratefully supported by Region staff and external Allied Health members to support our Disability Inclusion Profiles application processes. We have now been successful in being eligible for supportive funding for two of our students. We will complete a further four DIP processes in Term 3. Success with these processes ensures that our identified students have extra access to Aides and resources support to give them every opportunity to continue to thrive and to achieve their best!
- We were successful with our Grant application for Energy Breakthrough funding support via the ACCIONA Wind Farm Small Grants process.
- We were unsuccessful with our Grant application for AED – De-Fib set up funding support via the Hepburn Shire Small Grants process. We have a possible further avenue to pursue though so will keep you posted.
- In the last two + weeks: P-6 Disco & Focus Day 'Animals', 5 /6 Camp, Student Semester 1 Reports home, School Photos and our School Captains attended the Parliamentary Convention at Parliament House in Melbourne. So proud of you!
- The Early Learning Centre development process is underway. The Early Learning Centre planning stage is underway and the ELC will be built on our school's site. It will be built facing Paddock Street. ELC pre construction and construction works will begin at the end of this year and the ELC will be open for business at the beginning of 2026!
- Clunes Primary School has been active in providing considerations to the Shire for the Paddock Street housing development.

Wow! What a term! (and that is only some of it... ☺) **We practised our Values daily - We learn, We show respect, We are safe.** We will conduct our 3 Way Conferences (Parent Teacher Interviews) in Term 3 this year. Week 6 Thursday 22nd Aug. TBC

At the end of the Day 4 students from Clunes took home medals. Spencer and Xavier with Gold, Tahlee walked away with a silver and Duke T received a bronze medal.

We had our whole school athletics day in early Term 2. It was a beautiful day with many personal achievements and some amazing sportsmanship shown! Almost 40 of our students went on to represent Clunes at the Goldfield's Athletics in Ballarat. Well done to everyone involved!

P.E. Grants 2024!

So far this year we have been successful with 1 grant application where we received a \$2000 boost to our P.E. budget. We were able to buy a bowls kit for our students with the funds. Over the past 12 months we have been successful 3 times. This has added over \$6000 to our PE budget and we have been able to purchase things like full sized table tennis tables, bats and balls, as well as our bowls kit and 2 indoor ten-pin bowling kits! Dear Feather

Thank you for your interest and questions of The Salvation Army in relation to poverty and our responses currently.

The beginning of the Mission Statement for The Salvation Army Australia commences, "Wherever there is hardship or injustice, ..." I raise this as often people do not necessarily have control over whether they will be affected by poverty or not, it is something they may be subjected to because of the circumstances they find themselves in. One definition of poverty is, "the state of being extremely poor." I prefer this definition, "not having enough money to meet basic needs including food, clothing and shelter."

The definition assists organisations like The Salvation Army to determine what might be our response. How might we utilise our limited resources to make a difference for those affected by poverty.

There are a few different areas that The Salvation Army has made a commitment to attempt to assist and make changes toward the effect of poverty on people.

1. Assist those effected in practical ways. This might be with the provision of vouchers to purchase the necessary food supplies for a period, or sometimes by providing this food to people. It might also include other services like, financial counselling, no interest loans for specific items like a fridge or washing machine, accommodation services, the provision of clothing.
2. We also conduct research from the data in our service delivery and through contacting those we have helped to understand; has this made any difference for them; were there other things we could have done; are there better ways we could help them; anything else they want to tell us. This helps us to help them and others better in the future through the service we provide.
3. The Salvation Army advocates or speaks out on behalf of the people we help to ensure their voice or situation is heard by others. Sometimes this is through responding to Government with reports that highlights the circumstances of those living in poverty, talking about how difficult this is, what they have to do to try and get by, and making suggestions for change that might assist those living in poverty. This might be things like giving more money to living on benefits because the money they try to live off of is too low and means they are always struggling.

Poverty can also mean that people make poor choices, often because they are trying to forget the horrible situation they live in all the time. It is important that our help is provided with a care and compassion for people that reminds them that they matter, that they are valued and that someone loves them.

The main areas of services that The Salvation Army provides are in the following areas:

- a) Emergency Relief - food, clothing and other practical help
- b) Emergency Services – where people are affected by natural disasters like fire, flood, etc.
- c) Homelessness – accommodation and housing
- d) Addictions – alcohol and other drugs
- e) Youth Services – accommodation, counselling, etc.
- f) Family Violence - accommodation, counselling and support, etc.
- g) Employment Services
- h) Aged Care Services

I hope that this will help you with your project.

Thank you for being interested in The Salvation Army and what we do.

Dear Lacey,

Thank you for your letter. Sacred Heart Mission is thrilled to hear that young people like you are interested in preventing poverty and disadvantage in our community. We are based in Melbourne, but there are lots of organisations around Victoria and Australia who are trying to fix poverty – it is a big problem that everyone should care about.

Sacred Heart Mission works with people who are experiencing poverty, disadvantage and homelessness, sometimes for many years. Many people who come to us often sleep rough, which means they might sleep on the street or in their car. We believe everyone deserves a safe place to call home, and it is important to remember that poverty is not any one person's fault.

Unfortunately, when children and young people experience poverty, they are more likely to experience poverty as adults as well. This is very sad, but we can end poverty if we work together. Sacred Heart Mission provides a large range of services to adults in our community, including the Dining Hall, where we serve a hot breakfast and lunch every day, for people who don't have enough food to eat. When they come to us, they can also talk to someone about what is going on for them. For example, they might be homeless or not able to pay their rent and we connect them to services to help with this.

I have included a link to a video I thought you might like to watch, which tells you what it is like spending Christmas Day in the Dining Hall. Sometimes, Christmas can be a hard time of year for people who visit us, especially if they do not have any family, but we make sure everyone who visits us has a happy day for Christmas: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=xxD4ApArv3U>. If you would like to read more about us and what else we do, you can visit our website: www.sacredheartmission.org.

Sacred Heart Mission believes it is important that people experiencing poverty have respect and dignity in their lives. For this to happen, everyone needs to have enough money to have somewhere safe to live, access to clean water, food, and social connections. It is the government's job to look after people who are experiencing poverty and are disadvantaged. One way this happens is by providing money (we call this 'income support') for people who do not have a job, people with a disability and people who are elderly.

Right now, the amount that people receive from the government is not enough to cover basic necessities, and this makes poverty even worse. Therefore, people need help from organisations like Sacred Heart Mission. If you would like to help us tell the government that they should fix this problem, you can sign up to the Raise the Rate Campaign – visit <https://www.raisetherate.org.au/>.

As we are a charity, you can also do some fundraising for us if you like – we would be very grateful. Perhaps you could collect bottles and cans at home for the Victorian Container Deposit Scheme, and donate the money you receive to us? Have a look at this page for how to do this: <https://www.sacredheartmission.org/get-involved/fundraise-for-us/victorian-container-deposit-scheme/>.

Thank you again for your letter, Lacey. We always appreciate hearing from young people who want to make an impact in their community.


